REPORT ON THE 1ST UGANDA CHILDREN SUMMIT THAT WAS HELD FROM 8^{TH} TO 9^{TH} MAY, 2021 AT NYUMBANI HOTEL THAT WAS ORGANIZED BY SMART INTERNATIONAL

STARRING: YOUTH BOARDS OF KAMPALA'S SMART CLUBS

THEME: SAY NO TO ALCOHOL, TOBACCO, DRUGS WITH THE CONTRACT CONCEPT





Introduction and Background

There has been a tremendous increase in the access to internet by children during the COVID 19 Lockdown which has increased exposure of children to drugs, crime and violence among children since children are not in schools. Exposure of children to explicit images, photographs, writings, videos, films and other materials has been noted to be on the rise.

Early onsets on tobacco and alcohol are tightly connected to alcohol abuse and addiction, narcotics testing and addiction, criminality and a shortened life.

From the above background, Uganda Youth Development Link (UYDEL) in Partnership Kawempe Youth Development Association (KAYDA), Myself Uganda and Children and Youth Empowerment Link (CAYEL) with support from Smart international organized the 1st annual children summit that was conducted from 8th to 9th May, 2021 at Nyumbani Hotel, Kampala, Uganda.

The theme of the summit was "Say No to Alcohol drugs and tobacco"

The objectives of the summit were to;

- Create awareness among children about the dangers of alcohol drugs and crime.
- Develop life skills to reduce the risks of crime, violence and drug use through accumulation of protective factors such as knowledge, positive attitudes and life skills development.
- ➤ Interaction between children to share knowledge and experiences on how to prevent and protect themselves from drugs and crime.

1.2 Methodology used during the summit

During the session, the facilitators and patrons used educative and fun activities to implement the sessions and these included;

- Question and answers
- Small group discussions
- Large group discussions
- Presentations
- Brain storming
- Music, dance and drama
- Energizers
- Games and sports
- Role plays
- Aerobics

The summit was attended by children from six primary schools and these were;

- Makerere primary school
- > Jolly Kids Junior School
- Jehovah Jeirah Junior School
- Safe way Junior school
- Kasasa primary school
- St. Bernary Royal primary school

The summit was attended by 88 delegates and these included 45 males and 43 males as illustrated in the table below;

2.0 Proceedings of the summit

The summit started with a role play that was led by Mr. Kamoga Stanely. There were self-introductions from both the children and other participants of the summit.

He then asked two children to volunteer to be master of ceremonies (Mcs) for the summit and thus we got Nakyanzi Brenda from Kasasa Junior School and Bakunda Emmanuel from Makerere primary school. This was intended to promote child participation during the summit

These two child volunteers moved from table to table asking their fellow children the activities they wish to have during the summit and these included the following:

- Debate about alcohol abuse and drugs, children's rights must be respected among other
- Poem about drugs and alcohol
- Games and sports in particular netball, football
- Skit about the dangers of using alcohol and drugs
- ➤ Fun

2.1 Overview about smart International

There was a virtual session from Slim laden the secretary general of smart international and the participants of the summit in Uganda

Slim then introduced himself as the secretary general of smart international. In his speech, he said he has never smoked and tried alcohol and he is proud of himself. He urged the schools to sensitize children about alcohol and the dangers of drugs. Teachers and parents should take note that we need to change the behaviours of children.

He also talked about the contract concept which stresses that early onsets on tobacco and alcohol are tightly connected to alcohol abuse and addiction, narcotics testing and addiction, criminality and a shortened life. He said that he developed the contract concept to enable African countries say no to drugs and alcohol. He informed the children that there are smart clubs in Uganda, Rwanda, Burindi, Ghana, Liberia, Malawi, Indonesia, Kenya, and Tanzania among others and Uganda is the best with six schools in Kampala having smart clubs and one in Nakivale Camp

He then shared some interesting pictures with the children to learn from them and once again thanked the children and the Ugandan team for organizing the summit

2.2 Feedback from the children about the speech from Mr. Slim laden

- He gave us an advise about alcohol and drugs
- He said that we should not drink alcohol
- Let us abolish alcohol and drinking
- He said that if you start using drugs, you start reducing your age
- Slim said he has never tested drugs and alcohol
- He also said that the earlier you start using alcohol, the more addicted you become

2.3 Question and answer session

This session was conducted by the moderator. Mr. Kamoga Stanley who asked children questions and the following were the responses from the children

Question: What title does Mr. Slim hold?

Answer: Mr. Slim is the general secretary of smart international

Question: How old is Slim?

A: He is 76 years old

Question: What was his profession before he retired?

Answer: He was a teacher

Question: What was in the contracts the children signed?

- Don't use drugs
- Never to smoke again
- Never to bully your friends
- > Say no to alcohol
- It us to make steps or go wrong, the steps we make can take us forward or backward
- Respect parents and elders

Question: Tell us about smart club

Answer:

- You start small in stealing.
- > To be a good member of smart club, you need to observe the following;
- Never to use or taste any drug, alcohol and other substances
- We need to have respect for elders such as teachers, parents, elder's siblings
- Never to steal and vandalize peoples properties
- Never to bully other children

3.0 Communication from UYDEL

The communication from UYDEL was given by Mr. Kafuko Edwin is the UYDEL livelihood manager who talked on behalf of the Executive Director of UYDEL Mr. Kasirye Rogers

- ➤ He thus welcomed the children for the summit and all other delegates from the different schools.
- He thanked the schools who welcomed UYDEL for this cause
- He thanked smart international and the partners for the smart club including KAYDA, Myself Uganda and CAYEL Smart club
- ➤ He said that why the summit is hear is to say no to drugs and alcohol and I also "Say no to alcohol and drugs
- ➤ He said that alcohol has affected the young generation. He then asked the children some of the effects of drugs and alcohol abuse and the children reacted by giving the effects and these included addiction, brain damage, imprisonment, makes people merciless, causes lung cancer, school dropout, it leads to self and family neglect, poverty, domestic violence, low job performance and leads to death
- He also mentioned that the use of alcohol and drugs is not fun.
- ➤ He said UYDEL and other partners says No to drugs and are committed to making the future generation drug free
- The children shared the different types of drugs they know and these includes Marijuana, sisha, cocaine, Mila, nicotine among others

Energizer: He led the children into the energizer to make them have fun and be energetic. It was also intended to make the children more active during the sessions

3.1 More energizers

After Edwins speech, Lubega Andrew led the children in to a session of energizers (games, songs) and these included the following;

- Sharpie, sharp sharp energizer
- If you happy and you know clap your hand song
- Loose the table game. In this game, the children had to lose their tables and made a round circle

All these were intended to make children have fun, interact and learn skills such as stress management

4.0 Outdoor and fun activities

This session was led by Lunkuse Joan. She asked children if they have ever gone for camps and asked them what they do when in the camps and they said they have fun and relax. She thus assured them that during the summit, there will be a lot of fun through different activities such as games, role plays, and music among others

4.1 Song

Joan led the children through a song which they had to sing after her and the song was as follows;

What do you gonna do when you come for camp?

I am gonna have some fun

What do you consider fun?

> Fun drug free fun

After learning the song, the children were excited and already having fun. Children then started leading their fellow children through the song

Joan then asked the children if they have talents and they said yes and then one child who had a talent of singing led her fellows through a song which is from the book of Psalms. This was intended to enable young people discover and exploit their talents

4.2 Mingle Mingle game

Why the game: Help children connect with others and identify life skills

What: You're going to mingle in groups of 3 or more until we get the winners

4.2.1 Lessons learnt from the game

- People have fun and relax
- > Learnt to make friends
- I learnt to be faster
- Decision making, I have learnt to make decisions faster
- Critical thinking before acting
- Learnt to work in groups
- Learnt that without drugs, you can be free
- Learnt the importance of friends

4.2.2 Life skills learnt

- > Team work
- Decision making
- Building positive relationships

- Joan also led the children in to another game called Shrinking world
- Children were divided into groups of six and in each group, the children elected one volunteer

- The groups then competed in a game called Shrinking world
- The children were asked to dance and keep dancing and at the end of the game, they had to stand on a kaveera and those who could fit on the kavera would go and sit
- ➤ The game continued until when we got two children who competed at last and finally got a winner from the two children

- Learnt that we need to be ready and prepared all the time

4.4 Transporting the baby game

4.4.1 Why the game: To enable children have fun, learn critical thinking skill, self-management and build positive relationships

4.4.2 Instructions for the game

In their respective groups, each group was given a balloon and was asked to make lines according to their groups. The first person on the line was given a balloon and asked to blow the balloon and tie it. They were then asked to pass the balloons between their legs to the next person. The first group which bursts the balloon will be the winner.

4.4.3 Lessons learnt from the game

- Team work is very key
- There was need for speedy
- > There is need to be faster
- Learnt to be ready and focused all the time

- Learnt to work together
- > Learnt to be confident and to keep trying


8.0 Aerobics session


9.1.1 Lessons learnt from the presentation



10.0 Children Talk show

- They learnt decision making and problem solving skills


The children were able to identify examples of bad peer groups and these included;
