Recently, the Lagos State Branch of ISSUP Nigeria Chapter paid a courtesy visit to the National President of ISSUP Nigeria Chapter, Dr. Martin O. Agwogie, who is also the Founder/Executive Director of the Global Initiative on Substance Abuse (GISA). The visiting team comprised:

The visit commenced at about 2:00 p.m. with an opening address by the Lagos State Branch Coordinator, Mrs. Titilope M. Ogunluyi, who appreciated the President and thanked him for his leadership over the years. She pledged the branch's commitment to continue working towards the success of ISSUP Nigeria Chapter. She noted that the

team deemed it fit to come and learn from the wealth of experience of the President, hence the courtesy visit.

The South West Zonal Coordinator, Dr. Olajumoke Koyejo, in her remarks, noted that the visit was an emotional one for her. She reminisced about her journey with ISSUP Nigeria's establishment during the inaugural Universal Treatment Curriculum (UTC) 1 and 2 training



at the Federal Neuro Psychiatric Hospital, Yaba, in 2017. She said Dr. Martin O. Agwogie initiated the idea of starting ISSUP Nigeria at the training and thereafter became the President. She eulogized his leadership qualities, which remain proactive, strategic, focused, and unwavering despite challenges. She noted that the President has been committing his personal resources to the development of ISSUP in Nigeria, and that members are proud of him. She prayed for his good health and pledged continued partnership and collaboration. She called for his nomination for ISSUP Greece Conference award to honor him. On behalf of the South West and Lagos state branches, she thanked the President for the success story so far.

In his remarks, Dr. Adetolu I. Olatunde said he is both an ISSUP member and a GISA staff. He

appreciated the President for positioning and giving visibility to ISSUP Nigeria globally. He spoke of his leadership qualities that have propelled both ISSUP Nigeria and GISA to enviable heights. He recalled that his relationship with ISSUP Nigeria and GISA commenced in 2018 when he met the President at the International Consortium of Universities for Drug Demand Reduction (ICUDDR) 2nd conference/training in San Diego,

through the President's tutelage and support, he became a Coach and Trainer. He stated that the President's effort in ISSUP Nigeria has yielded good results. He also called for his support and nomination for the award at ISSUP Greece Global Conference. He prayed for his good health of mind and body.

In his response, the President thanked ISSUP Lagos state branch for the visit and commended them for all the good work. He noted that his activities, over the years, right from his time with the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA), were all geared towards service to



humanity. He remarked that leadership is a learning process and elaborated on the importance of working with a clear conscience as a leader. He thanked his wife, Mrs. Faith Martin Agwogie, who has always stood by him with the needed support to provide the necessary leadership and service to humanity, and appreciated all ISSUP members who have been very supportive.

The President emphasized the need to do things right and professionalism in the field of drug demand reduction (DDR) and in line with evidence-based practices. Such, he said, comes with

both local and international recognition. He cited his NGO, GISA, as an example. He noted that GISA attained the United Nations (UN) Consultative Status as a member of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) within 3 years of its operation, which was one of the fastest in the world.

He spoke about his journey in

DDR when in the service of the NDLEA, emphasizing professionalism, passion, and dedication. He noted that even though he was recruited into the Agency as an operative, he developed a passion for DDR after a year in service (that was 1997), which led to his Master's and PhD in psychology with research interest in DDR. He noted that his practical DDR activities and training started in 2010 with the first round of TREATNET training to becoming a United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) TREATNET and Drug Prevention Treatment and Care (DPTC) Master Trainer. He gave credit to the NDLEA where he worked for 23 years before his voluntary retirement for providing him several opportunities and encouragement, including the publication and launching of 3 books (on drug demand reduction) in 2012.

The President, who is also a member of the Board of Directors of ISSUP Global, took time to provide a historical background to the development of ISSUP, ICUDDR, UTC, and the Universal Prevention Curriculum (UPC) in Nigeria. He gave credit to some individuals and



institutions like Dr. Olajumoke Koyejo and the Federal Neuro Psychiatric Hospital Yaba for the introduction of UTC and the Global Initiative on Substance Abuse (GISA) for the introduction of the UPC in Nigeria. He noted that these initiatives have greatly helped in strengthening the DDR workforce in Nigeria.

On the development of ISSUP in Nigeria, he noted that a journey that started in 2016 like a one-man squad (himself alone) has now become a very big family in the field of DDR in Nigeria, with close to three thousand members. He noted that it is a dream come true after 28 years in the field of drug control and knowing one of the major challenges which is lack of cooperation among professionals and major stakeholders, including government agencies. He noted that everyone has a role to play as far as drug control is concerned, thus bringing all the stakeholders on board with appropriate capacity, knowing where to draw the line and make necessary referrals is one of the keys to effective drug control in Nigeria and around the world. This is what ISSUP has brought on board, he noted.



The visit ended at about 4.00pm with prayer by the State Coordinator and cutting of the president's birthday cake as the visit coincided with his birthday.





ISSUP LAGOS STATE

Valentine's Day Drug Sensitization Campaign in Delta State

In Delta State, ISSUP, in collaboration with Revive our Youth Initiative (ROYI) and Cheno Foundation, conducted a drug and substance abuse sensitization campaign on February 14th, 2024, to commemorate Valentine's Day under the theme "Spread Love, Not Drugs." The campaign, targeting the younger generation, visited three schools: Jeddo Secondary School Jeddo, Faithland School Jeddo, and Ezezi Secondary School Ugoto. Commencing at 8 a.m., the campaign aimed to coincide with the assembly period of the first school, Jeddo Secondary School, Jeddo. At the school, Mrs. Olabisi, the state assistant coordinator, delivered a talk titled "Spread Love, Not Drugs," covering the definition of drugs, illegal substances, and the consequences of drug abuse. Following the lecture, a question-and-answer session was held, facilitated by the coordinator of ISSUP Delta state Branch, Reverend Father Christopher A. Ogaga, and his assistant. The session concluded with an encouragement for students to refrain from drugs and to "Spread Love, Not Drugs," followed by a closing prayer. TACKLING ALCOHOL HARM: ISSUP NIGERIA'S RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SCHOOL-BASED PREVENTION

In Nigeria, the allure of Big Alcohol profits is escalating, but so are the concerns about the health and well-being of its people. With rising sales revenues and profits for major alcohol companies, the Nigerian government faces mounting pressure to prioritize alcohol policy to safeguard its citizens.

Recent data reveals a staggering increase in profits for the four largest alcohol companies in Nigeria, marking a 31.2% surge in sales revenue compared to the previous year. These profits, however, come at a heavy cost to society, with alcohol-related harm manifesting in health, social, and economic burdens.

The World Health Organization (WHO) reports alarming statistics, indicating high per capita alcohol consumption and a prevalence of binge drinking among Nigerians. This consumption pattern translates into substantial health repercussions, including liver cirrhosis, road traffic injuries, and cancer-related deaths.

Despite the evident harm caused by alcohol, Nigeria lacks comprehensive alcohol policy frameworks. This regulatory gap allows alcohol companies to operate with minimal restrictions, exposing vulnerable populations, particularly children and youth, to the aggressive marketing and availability of alcohol.

Recognizing the urgent need for action, the Federal Ministry of Health has taken a significant step forward by initiating the development of a national alcohol policy. In collaboration with stakeholders such as the International Society of Substance Use Professionals (ISSUP) Nigeria Chapter, efforts are underway to formulate strategies addressing alcohol manufacture, distribution, advertising, and consumption.

At a recent workshop convened by the Ministry, ISSUP Nigeria played a significant role in advocating for evidence-based alcohol policy interventions. Among the key recommendations put forth by ISSUP Nigeria's Alcohol Policy Committee, chaired by Hashim Ubale, are targeted strategies for school-based prevention.

ISSUP Nigeria's recommendations emphasize the importance of education and prevention initiatives within educational institutions. These include orientation programs on the dangers of alcohol consumption across all levels of schooling, from primary to tertiary education.

Additionally, measures such as eliminating alcohol promotion targeting school children and enforcing reasonable distance regulations for alcohol sales near schools aim to create safer environments for students.

Moreover, ISSUP Nigeria advocates for the involvement of parents, teachers, and community stakeholders in addressing alcohol-related issues within schools. This holistic approach encompasses integrating alcohol education into school curricula, establishing support structures such as counselling units, engaging with local communities to raise awareness about alcohol abuse prevention, and creating community-based support groups for individuals struggling with alcohol use disorder and their families to provide encouragement, guidance and resources for recovery.

Furthermore, ISSUP Nigeria calls for strict regulations prohibiting alcohol brands from sponsoring school programs, particularly in nursery, primary, and secondary schools. By safeguarding educational environments from alcohol influence, these measures aim to protect the well-being and future prospects of Nigeria's youth.

As Nigeria navigates the complex landscape of alcohol policy reform, initiatives such as those proposed by ISSUP Nigeria offer an important contribution for mitigating alcohol-related harm. By prioritizing evidence-based prevention strategies, Nigeria can strive towards a healthier and safer future for its citizens.

In the quest for sustainable development and societal well-being, addressing alcohol harm is not just a priority but a vital necessity. Through concerted efforts and collaboration between government, civil society, and stakeholders like ISSUP Nigeria, Nigeria can pave the way towards a brighter, alcohol-responsible future.



ROAD SAFETY REVOLUTION: TRANSFORMING NIGERIAN TRANSPORT SECTOR WITH DRUG DEMAND REDUCTION PARTNERSHIP

The strategic approach of integrating policy development and collaborating with key stakeholders like NDLEA and health professionals reflects a comprehensive effort. The success at the 17th National Council on Transportation (NCT) and subsequent partnerships with Road Accident Prevention Network Centre (RAPNEC NG), and ISSUP demonstrate progress and commitment.

The inclusion of the drug demand reduction (DDR) curriculum into existing transport sector training programs, with collaboration from prominent institutions like Chartered Institute of Logistics and Transport Nigeria (CILT), Chartered Institute of Transport Administrators (CIOTA), Nigerian Institute of Transport Technology (NITT) is a forward-thinking step. The emphasis on addressing drunk driving and substance-induced Road Transport Accidents aligns with global concerns highlighted by WHO since 2018. The partnership's commitment to the UN Decade of Action on Road Safety 2021-2030 further reinforces their dedication to making a significant impact in this critical area.

Overall, the initiative appears well-structured and positioned to contribute significantly to reducing substance-induced accidents in the Nigerian transport sector.

The President and Founder of Road Accident Prevention Network Centre (RAPNEC NG), Prince Ache Julius Ogu, commended ISSUP Nigeria for the bold step in tackling Road Traffic Collisions (RTC), which claims about 3.5 million lives globally every year with over 50 million injured. Critical stakeholders are welcomed to join the partnership towards a safer transport system in Nigeria.





