Course Key Objectives:

- To equip participants with methods to develop and scale-up interventions for people with mental disorders in low resource setting.
 - To enhance the leadership skills needed to scale-up mental health care programs and promote the human rights of people with mental disorders.

Who is this course for?

This course is designed for people who are committed to improving care for those with mental disorders and promoting their human rights, particularly in settings where mental health resources are scarce. Prior expertise in a clinical specialityrelated to mental health is not essential.

Fees:

The course fees (including all materials, but not including room and board) are:

Residents of Egypt: 500\$

Residents of other low-income countries (as defined by World Bank): 800\$

Residents of middle-income countries: 1000\$

Residents of high-income countries: 1500\$

*There are limited scholarships for the course fee's available for participants from Low income countries




Oye Gureje

He is also Extraordinary Professor, Department of Psychiatry, Stellenbosch University, South Africa. His main research nterests are in epidemiology and global mental health. He has conducted large scale community- based surveys, large randomized controlled trials, implementation research and research on health system strengthening with grant supports from the Welcome Trust, MRC (UK), EU, AusAid, Grand Challenges Canada, IDRC and the NIMH, among others. He has published more than 600 peer-reviewed scientific papers, monographs, book chapters, and has co-edited 3 books and has, for several years, been listed among the Highly Cited Researchers in the world by Clarivate. A recipient of many awards, he is a Fellow of the Nigerian Academy of Science, Fellow of the Nigerian Academy of Medicine, and a laureate of the Nigerian National Order of Merit.
